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#### Basics of Catholicism part 71

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

The third principal part of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is the only one that requires a priest. We can acknowledge our sin and be contrite. God can even choose to forgive anyone he wants at any time. Yet, the Sacrament exists because of our need for the assurance of being forgiven and to be honest with ourselves. Therefore, the third principal part is the Prayer of Absolution. The Prayer of Absolution is the prayer that defines this Sacrament and gives it its character. Without this prayer, the Sacrament would be nothing more than a chat session or a counseling session. Once this prayer is said, all the sins the person confessed are absolved. They are gone. The person is no longer held accountable for those sins in the eyes of God. Due to the power of this prayer and its value in forgiving sins, priests are very careful when and how they say this prayer. The Church has an option called "General Absolution." General Absolution functions very similarly to a normal Confession except that the only part of this event is the Prayer of Absolution. In extreme cases, when it is either not possible or not pastorally prudent to hear everyone's confession, the priest can say the Prayer of Absolution and absolve everyone of their sins. This is the power of this prayer. I will come back to issues regarding General Absolution and its limitations later. For now, I use this example to show the incredible power of this prayer and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Jesus gave the power of forgive sins on his behalf to his priests who use this power for all of you. Through the Prayer of Absolution we can hear the words that we are forgiven, know with certainty about our absolution, and be able to feel confident and healed leaving the Sacrament.

Which leads us to the fourth principal part of the Sacrament: Satisfaction. The most common way that the Church explains the importance of "satisfaction" as part of this Sacrament is through the penance. The penance that the priest gives the person is a simple way through which we can help to overcome our sinful behaviors, recognize God's goodness, and return to the Lord. These penances aren't meant to be severe or overly difficult lest we believe that we cause our own forgiveness. Instead, they are a movement of the heart towards God saying "Lord, I want to do better for you." Thus the first way to understand the character of satisfaction is through our gift of a penance with the hope of bringing good into the world out of our evil. The second way to understand satisfaction is the feeling of being forgiven. Often, especially for people who frequently receive absolution, people don't necessarily feel forgiven after leaving the confessional. This is not a problem. If we limit satisfaction to a feeling, we dismiss the power of this part of the Sacrament. Satisfaction is the fundamental belief that we have been forgiven, a new life has dawned for us, Jesus has shown us the power of his death and Resurrection, and now we are in God's good graces. These statements of belief should be enough to encourage everyone to go. We need to fundamentally believe that we are forgiven, that God is merciful, that we have been fully forgiven, and that we are not bound to our sins anymore for the full effect of satisfaction to transform our lives.




### Parish potlucks
