
The Sacrament of Reconciliation

The Sacrament of Reconciliation has four necessary parts. The first necessary part is the confession of sins. Without the confession of sins, nothing happens. No absolution. No forgiveness. No Sacrament. These words may seem harsh or specific but they are true. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is effective only when sins are confessed. The reason for the Sacrament and the only thing the Sacrament of Reconciliation does is absolve sins. Priests are instructed that they are not allowed to use the prayer of absolution in two cases. The first case is when no sins are confessed. Without and sins confessed, we must ask the questions: what is the priest absolving? In order for the priest to function in his Sacramental role, the person must confess their sins. The second case is if the person is clearly not contrite for their sins. Priests are instructed to assume contrition unless the person shows an undeniable lack of contrition.

I spent considerable time explaining the importance of confessing sins in the Sacrament of Reconciliation to illustrate the point that this Sacrament is about forgiving sins. This is not a chat session with the priest, a time for prayer or to ask for a blessing, nor is it for spiritual direction. The main core element is the power of Jesus to forgive the sins of those who come and to allow them a fresh start and a chance to know of the power of God in their lives. Often people are either scared to confess their sins or want to withhold them from the priest. One of Jesus' parables illustrates the depth of the power of the experience of this Sacrament. Jesus says "'Two people owed a king a sum of money. One owed a huge amount and the other much less. The king decided to forgive both of them their entire debt. Which of the two loved the king more?' Peter responds, 'the one with the larger debt." Jesus makes the point to us that when we have the freedom to unveil all our sins and know that they will be forgiven, our love for the Lord grows. This Sacraments was given to us that we may have that freedom to unveil all of our sins without worrying about the repercussions of our sins.

The second principal part of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is contrition. If we are not sorry for our sins, then why are we asking for forgiveness? Is it a vain desire to be free of the guilt or to feel that you are not longer bound by that sin? True contrition is very important for both the effectiveness and the experience of this Sacrament. The level of our contrition directly correlates to the experience of forgiveness. A priest can withhold absolution from a person who doesn't exhibit contrition. Although this is possible, the conditions for withholding absolution are quite specific. The priest generally assumes the person is contrite by coming to Confession. If, however, a person shows strong evidence that they either want to keep doing the sin, have no remorse for it, or do not see it as wrong, the priest could withhold absolution to help the person realize the gravity of their sins. Another important point is that absolution only works on the confessed sins and the ones for which the person is contrite. Even if the prayer of absolution is said, the Sacrament is not magic. It applies to those sins that the person has confessed and the ones for which the person is contrite.
