#### Basics of Catholicism part 75

#### The Seven Deadly Sins

Following from the last part in this series on mortal sins, I want to briefly cover the Seven Deadly Sins. These particular sins have much more cultural weight than the mortal sins I mentioned in the last section. Although they are all serious sins, each of them colors the picture of the challenges we face and the route to good relationships with ourselves, the people around us, and God.

Gluttony: gluttony is the overconsumption of anything for our benefit. Often we use the image of food to describe this sin but it can take the form of anything. The basic idea is that I can consume as much as I want without regard to myself or others. I am happiest when I am full and can consume whatever I want. Notice the turn inwards towards oneself. The person doesn't care about anyone or anything but themselves. The virtues of prudence and self-control are necessary in fighting this sin. We need balance and control in order to control our passions and direct them to something good.

Envy: "envy is the green-eyed monster which thou dost seek" (Othello). Shakespeare describes this sin as a green-eyed monster. The person's desires are driven by the thing another person has. Because that person has the thing I want, I cannot be happy. Again, the turn is towards the person. I don't care about the happiness of the other person nor them as a person. I only want the thing I want. The virtue associated with envy is thankfulness. If we are grateful for the gifts that other people have and our own gifts, then we cannot be envious.

Vanity: vanity is the overconcern with appearance. Often vanity is described by an overconcern with looks or beauty. Vanity encompasses looks, image, prestige, position or status, or anything else that is affected by the way we feel perceived by others. Often those who are deeply affected by vanity will not allow people to see them unless they are presented in the specific way they want or will isolate themselves because of the loss of sense of self caused by a change in status or appearance. Vanity can also work in the opposite direction. A lack of care for oneself or a lack of care resulting in a detrimental feeling of self is also vanity. The virtue tied to vanity is modesty. Modesty builds a sense of personal well-being and a feeling of respect for oneself.

Lust: lust is the most obvious of the seven sins and the one most frequently used in advertising. Lust is the desire to control or make someone/thing an object of our desires. The most common example is to take a person and make them an object of our sexual passion completely ignoring the value of the person. Yet, we can act lustfully towards anyone and anything. Anytime we feel that the object can fulfill us if we possess it, this is lust. The proper relationship with people and objects is to understand their intrinsic dignity and treat them with that dignity. The virtue associated with lust is chastity. Chastity is the right ordering of our passions so that we can effectively use them for right and good actions.






