Common arguments for abortion or misconceptions

Argument #1: Abortion is about a fetus not a human being

This argument begs the questions: what is a fetus? A group of cells, a cancer, a by-product of a pregnancy? All of these ideas are ludicrous for a very obvious reason: what does a fetus become? I have never gone up to a pregnant woman and asked her, what are you having? We all know the end of a pregnancy is a baby, a human life. Fetuses have no other option that to be a human life. They cannot become any other creature and therefore we must consider them human, since they are in every way.

Argument #2: abortion should be allowed due to complicated pregnancies in which the mother's life in in danger.

This argument fits into the fallacy of special case: a situation in which a special case justifies making the action normative. For instance, if some people need medical marijuana to help their chronic condition, then everyone should be able to have marijuana. From a basic starting point, because a woman might die in childbirth, does not justify the ability for all women to abort their children. Similarly, the Church does have a stance on this issue. Recall: an abortion is the intentional act of killing a fetus. In the event that the mother's life is in danger, the doctors could try to induce labor, surgically remove the child, or attempt other medical procedures that might save both lives. In the event that they chose to remove the fetus before the end of the pregnancy, the goal would be to try to keep the baby alive. Do you see the difference? An abortion is the intentional act of killing the fetus whereas the surgical removal has the intention of saving both lives even though the child may die.

Argument #3: abortion prevents more unwanted pregnancies and prevents more unwanted children.

This argument could also be categorized as the "population control argument." I first find it sad that we use language of "unwanted children" and justify killing children because we "don't want them." Regardless this argument hinges on many social problems: overabundant use of birth control, a desire for independence and a diminishing desire for children, a desire for sex without consequences. The only way to stop unwanted pregnancies is to have less sex or to be more conscious of our bodies and the natural cycle of fertility and infertility that is part of the menstrual cycle. On another note, if we have built a society that sees children as bad or unwanted, what does this type of argument tell us about the health of our society? We need to spend some time with the implications of this argument and how it affects our society.




## Ministry Highlights

## Have A Seat!

After consultation with the Pastoral and Finance Councils as well as those who came to the parish meetings, we are moving forward with buying new pews. This project contains several parts.
