

Basics of Catholicism part 44

Christmas

The Season of Christmas is the second shortest liturgical season of the year. Depending on the calendar it can be anywhere between 2 weeks and 3 weeks long. The season of Christmas begins on Christmas Eve, December 24th, and concludes with the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord. The basic structure of the Season is complicated. Christmas is always on December 25th and the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God is always on January 1st. The Sunday between the 25th and the 1st is the Feast of the Holy Family, unless January 1st is on a Sunday. Then the Feast of the Holy Family is on the previous Friday. The Sunday after January 1st is The Feast of Epiphany. Some Dioceses choose to celebrate the Feast of Epiphany on the traditional date of January 6th. Thus there are 12 days between Christmas and Epiphany. If Epiphany is later than January 7th, then the Baptism of our Lord is on the Monday after Epiphany. Otherwise, the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord is on the Sunday after Epiphany.

With all those confusing dates and changes out of the way, let's focus on the core characteristics of this season and its principle feasts. The color for the Christmas season is whiteThe focal point of the season is obvious: the birth of Jesus. Everything in this season focuses on and explains the central event in salvation history of Jesus becoming human. A subtle point that many people do not realize is that the season of Christmas directs our attention to Easter. Themes throughout the prayers, some hymns, and many of the feasts draw our attention to the impending crucifixion, death, and Resurrection of Jesus as the reason for this birth.

The Octave of Christmas

The Octave of Christmas, or the eight days between Christmas and Mary, Mother of God, is the strangest octave of the year. Whereas the Octave of Easter is quite simple with each day being a day of Easter and no other celebrations allowed, Christmas it the opposite. The day after Christmas we celebrate the martyrdom of St. Stephen, the first martyr in the Church. Hence, Jesus birth led to the first person to witness to his coming by his blood. The second day of the Octave is the feast of John the Apostle. The only Apostle not to be martyred. The third day of the Octave is the Feast of the Holy Innocents commemorating the death of those 2 years old and younger caused by Herod's desire to kill the Messiah. Two minor saints are celebrated within this octave. The Octave of Christmas is filled with the effects of Jesus' birth and a reflection on the influence his birth had on the world.

The most striking part of the Octave of Christmas is the readings at daily Mass. For the entirety of the Christmas Season we read through the letters of St. John. These letters beautifully reflect on the mystery of Jesus' birth and the practical reality that we could touch, see, and hear God.
